ICE BREAKER

This past week, we celebrated Thanksgiving, which leads us into the Christmas season. This brings us to a highly debated topic: decorating your home for Christmas. Do you deck the halls before or after Thanksgiving?

SERMON OVERVIEW

What if the most beloved Christmas carol we sing each year contains layers of theological richness we've never fully explored? This message takes us on a fascinating journey through the history of Christmas carols—from their scandalous beginnings, to their transformation into the joyful celebrations we know today. We discover that 'Hark the Herald Angels Sing' wasn't an instant success; Charles Wesley's original lyrics flopped for over a century before Felix Mendelssohn added music and William Cummings refined the words. This reminds us that our obedience to God's calling may not bear visible fruit in our lifetime, but God is always orchestrating something greater across generations. The sermon unpacks each verse of this carol, revealing how it declares Christ's divinity, his humble incarnation, and the reconciliation between God and humanity. Like the shepherd priests who were the first to hear of the spotless Lamb of God's arrival, we're invited to join heaven's eternal celebration and make it known to a world desperately needing hope.

READ SCRIPTURE

LUKE 2:8-15 & PSALM 148

READ THE LYRICS TO 'HARK THE HERALD ANGELS SING'

CONNECT RELATIONALLY

- 1) What is your favorite Christmas carol and why? Have you ever thought about the theology and meaning behind the words?
- 2) We heard a story about a basketball player named Eli. Reflect on a time in your life when you needed to rely on God's strength, as Eli's teammates did for him. How did that make you feel, and how did it shape your faith journey?
- 3) How does Charles Wesley's story (his song wasn't popular until 100+ years later) encourage you when you don't see immediate results from your obedience? How do we remain faithful while giving the results to God?

**GROW
SPIRITUALLY**

4) How do lines like "veiled in flesh, the Godhead see" enhance your comprehension of the doctrine of the incarnation? What does it mean that Jesus was "fully God, fully divine, yet veiled in humility"? Why do you think God chose to reveal Himself this way?

5) What does Psalm 148 reveal about God's desire for all creation to praise Him? How does viewing worship as "joining a triumph already happening" change your approach to praise? How does this approach help us show 'joy'?

6) Our carol states, "pleased with us, in flesh to dwell," The sermon mentioned this wasn't the first time God dwelled with mankind (Garden of Eden). What does it reveal about God's character that He chose to do it again after humanity's rebellion?

7) Do you find your distinct and unique voice within this choir and triumph? If worship feels unnatural or uncomfortable to you, what might be holding you back from joining the joyful celebration? How can you adjust your posture?

8) Like the shepherds who immediately spread the good news, what holds us back from sharing our faith with friends and family who don't know Jesus?

9) The sermon listed three key responses to the gospel reflected in this week's carol: Receive the good news, Rejoice in the Triumph, Reach out to those around you. Which of these comes naturally to you? Which is challenging?
